Healthcare for All: Independent Inquiry into Access to Healthcare for People with Learning Disabilities

The Inquiry, led by Sir Jonathan Michael, sought to identify the action needed to make sure people with learning disabilities receive appropriate treatment in acute and primary healthcare in England.

The Inquiry was launched following the Mencap publication of *Death by Indifference*

Inquiry Recommendations include:

better inspection and regulation of the NHS in relation to its treatment of people with learning disabilities

better data collection and identification of people with learning disabilities within the NHS

a confidential inquiry into the avoidable deaths of people with a learning disability and a permanent public health observatory

learning disability training for healthcare professionals

the involvement of family carers in care and treatment

provision of 'reasonable adjustments' for by health services, including regular health checks and liaison staff across services

Final Report of NHS Next Stage Review

The much heralded 'Darzi Review' published its final report at the end of June. It seems somewhat strange to be covering this and the Michaels Inquiry report in the same newsletter.

Whilst they are both concerned with the delivery of health care services the differences in the description of patient's care and experience could not be more different.

In the introduction Lord Darzi says of the NHS
"The NHS is there when we need it most. It provides round the clock, compassionate care and comfort"

In contrast to the Inquiry findings for people with learning disabilities
"witnesses described some appalling examples of discrimination, abuse and neglect across the range of health services"

The Darzi report reinforces the personalisation agenda and sets out a series of commitments that resonate with those of the Independent Inquiry including:

Getting the basics right - improving safety & quality

Quality Improvement - public health observatories in every region

Improving the quality of NHS training

The A2A network was formed in 1998 and has expanded to become a national network for people who support people with a learning disability when they are in the general hospital

Launch of 6C's Confirm & Challenge!

The '6C's Confirm and Challenge' is our online resource to support commissioners and providers interested in the health and wellbeing of people with learning disabilities. It does this by providing a model on which to build services that support better health for people with learning disabilities and resources to support the changes required.

It is based on '6 Core Outcomes' that are drawn from a wide range of government policy and guidance that covers both specialist services and mainstream health and social care. It aims to help people to **confirm** the direction of travel and make improvements in commissioning and delivery and to **challenge** and reduce the inequalities faced by people with learning disabilities within the NHS. Within each outcome is a set of 'key principles' against which commissioners and providers can map progress and contains examples of action/activities or outcomes that would evidence progress in that particular area.

In each section we have also included links to some of the relevant policies, guidance and other key documents.

The 6 Core Outcomes

Centredness – putting the person and their family at the centre – personalized services that are dignified and respectful of individual needs

Community – promoting health and wellbeing, focusing on prevention and early intervention and delivering services close to home

Citizenship – increasing choice and control, promoting inclusion and a 'human rights based approach'

Commissioning – working in partnership to deliver improved outcomes and reduce inequalities

Competence – developing the skills and knowledge within services and within people who use services, their family carers and supporters

Checking – ensuring services are high quality, clinically effective and safe

Although its initial focus is on the commissioning and provision of specialist learning disability health services, it will be expanding to include sections on other parts of the health service.

Some parts of it are still in development (such as our tool to support Community Learning Disability Teams) but we thought it would be useful to share our 'work in progress'.

We are also in the process of uploading good practice examples and information developed within services onto the website.
