Revolving Doors

- Funded via the London Housing Foundation to demonstrate innovative approaches to working more effectively with the revolving door group through the facilitation of new multi-agency partnerships.
- Scoping was undertaken with senior strategic stakeholders to develop a range of priority themes.
- The themes were matched to boroughs within London that identified with one or more of the themes. Islington was one of the three boroughs.
- This is the final 6 months of the delivery stage, having established developmental partnerships to problem solve and find creative solutions to the local priorities identified.
- The Connect London programme is being independently evaluated and the lessons learned will be disseminated by Revolving Doors.

Islington Project

Problem Definition:

- Local stakeholders met and identified some critical service gaps
- Health listened to what the CJS needed
- Focused the work on the Integrated Offender Management cohort
- Clinical review of cohort revealed a significant high proportion with a MH need

Identified Objectives:

- Improve access to assessment and treatment for IOM cases
- Improve communication between the agencies
- Develop pathways and fill service gaps
- Develop shared objectives and outcomes

Vision for the Sector



To develop a care pathway for the North Justice Sector which addresses the complex needs of the local offender population, underpinned by an ethos of integrated partnership working.

Three key principles of the Highbury Model

Strategic link's with the sector community safety partnerships:

Creates a robust relationship across the organisations based on the principles of a shared ownership and commitment to meeting the needs of the offender population.

Co-locate and integrate stat and non-stat services into a sector wide offender care pathway:

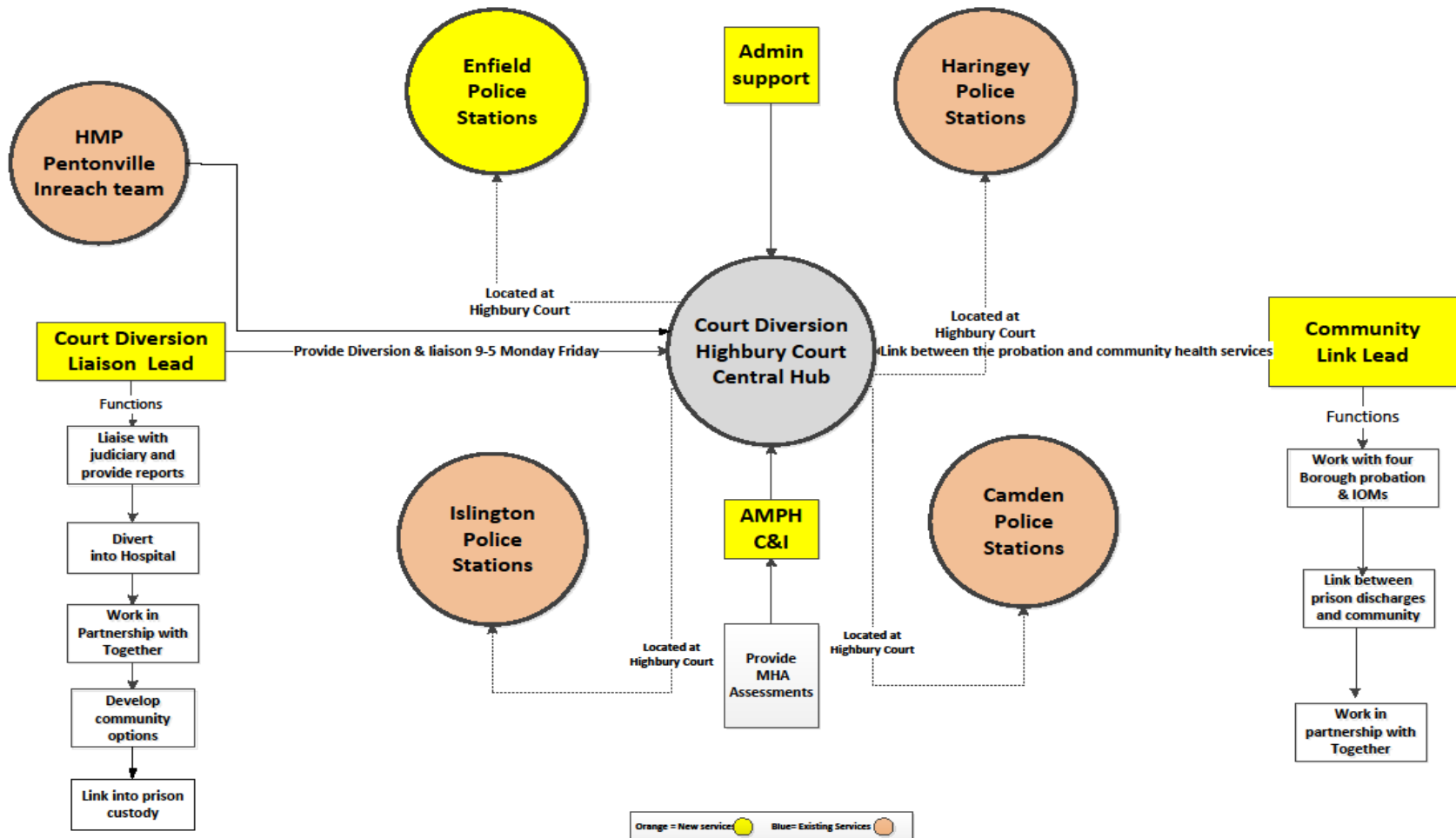
Supports the development of an integrated problem solving approach and fosters innovative creative solutions.

Distant monitoring:

Offender tracking promotes continuity of service provision to limit the risks of re-offending behaviour on releases from prison.

The Progress Bar

- Introduced IAPT clinics into probation
- Formed links with the CSPB and IOM teams
- Co-located and integrated some services and functions like assessment clinics
- Developing treatment packages that can be utilised for community treatment orders
- Creating pre and post diversion work
- Extending and strengthening the pathway with the third sector
