Let's make it a life worth living – human rights and learning disabilities

This conference will provide practical ways to illustrate how human rights principles and standards can be used to secure a better quality of life for people with learning disabilities.

Why is this important?

In 2001, the Valuing People White Paper included “rights” as one of its four guiding principles. Current Government policy stresses the importance of “citizenship”, the personalisation agenda and person centred approaches in response to the human rights agenda.

However, the Joint Committee on Human Rights Report “A Life Like Any Other?” (2008) identifies that the human rights of people with learning disabilities are violated every day. This report draws attention to a widening gap between Government policies and the daily lives of people with learning disabilities who are more likely to experience social exclusion, poverty and isolation.

In addition, recent investigations and audits of services have exposed neglect, abuse, discrimination and indifference.

It is anticipated that Valuing People Now will strongly emphasise that people with learning disabilities have the same human rights as everyone else, and that public services have a duty to respect and promote these rights in everything they do.

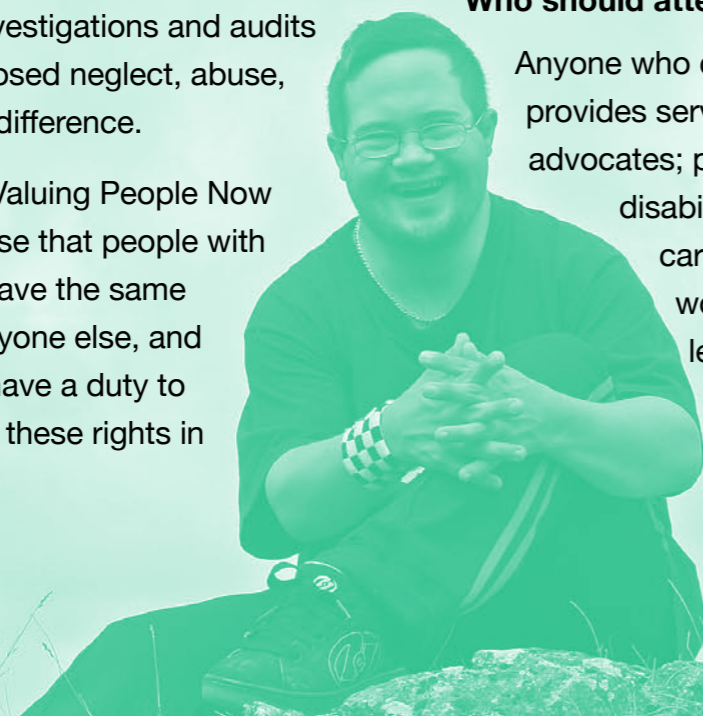
In response, this conference will raise awareness of how human rights can be used as a practical tool to tackle inequality. It will link the legislation – the Human Rights Act 1998 and the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 (as amended) – to best practice, showing how human rights can act as a powerful and accessible lever to obtain better support and services to aid decision making, and ensure that the keys to citizenship are available to all.

Aims of the conference

- To raise awareness of the relevance of human rights for people with learning disabilities and their families, carers and support workers
- To provide information on key issues around public service provision
- To provide examples of good practice and explore practical strategies for the sector

Who should attend?

Anyone who commissions or provides services; frontline staff; advocates; people with learning disabilities and family carers or anyone who works for people with learning disabilities.
