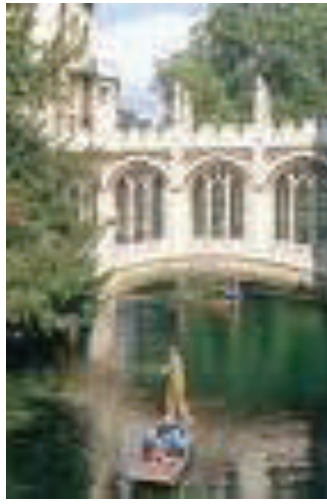

The Venue

The conference will take in the purpose built, self contained Conference Centre, Buckingham House. We will be using the air-conditioned Lecture Theatre and Seminar Rooms during the conference which are very comfortable and spacious.

New Hall, please report to the Porters Lodge where you can check in and be directed to Buckingham house.

Directions to the Venue:

New Hall is situated on Huntingdon Road, 1 mile west of Cambridge City Centre. On arrival report to Porters' Lodge (tel: 01223 762100) located at the College's main entrance just off Huntingdon Road.

From the M11, take junction 13 onto the A1303 towards the City Centre. From the A14, take junction 31 onto the A1307 towards the City Centre. Use the [Park and Ride](#) on Madingley Road to ensure easy parking. Red route 77, alight at Storey's Way. Please look at the [Local Area map](#) for more details of the area around New Hall.

It is probably quickest and easiest to take a taxi from the Rail Station to New Hall. Alternatively, during the day, a regular bus service operates from the Station to the City Centre and then from outside the Post Office, on St. Andrews Street, take the Citi 5 or Citi 6 bus to New Hall. There is an hourly service operated by National Express from Stansted Airport to Cambridge Bus Station. The journey takes 45 minutes.
