

## **Inclusive Theory and Practice: empowering people with learning disabilities (PG Certificate)**

This programme aims to support the development of reflective practitioners in the field of inclusive practice with disabled people – with a special focus on including people with learning disabilities.

Current policy promotes participation and decision-making by students and service users in education, research and policy making. These trends have a particular significance for people with learning disabilities. How do we move beyond ‘tokenism’? How do we provide empowering support?

### **Entry Requirements**

If you have a personal or professional interest in Learning Disability, a relevant first degree (or equivalent experience), and the ability to study at postgraduate level, this course could be for you!

## **PG Certificate**

The programme consists of three units, any of which could be taken independently. The Certificate is awarded on successful attainment of 60 credit points, and you can study one year part-time, or flexibly over two years.

- Term 1:  
**Inclusive research with disabled people** (20 credit points)
- Term 2:  
**Including students’ voices** (20 credit points)
- Term 3:  
**Participation in policy making** (20 credit points)
