## 'Back to the Future' – agendas and challenges

### **Background to the Conference**

Integrate's first services started in 1983, resettling people back to their home town, Preston, into ordinary terraced housing, developing individually tailored support. With a strong commitment to integration into the community, Integrate developed other services, some in partnership including community and employment services and a wider delivery to other disabled groups

Integrate's extensive partnership with the University of Central Lancashire includes early development work in Plungington Community Centre, its first adult education classes in their computer department and long-term partnership working in social work student placements including a joint staff appointment. This conference celebrates the lives of the people they support and have supported as well as the partnership working in their home town enhancing their lives.

### The Conference aims:

- To bring together a number of current and past partners and other professionals to celebrate together the developments made across the last 25 years in the learning disability services
- To give the opportunity for both UCLan and Integrate's lead specialists with some service users to share their practice - all of whom have histories with Integrate's service development
- To consider the learning across the past 25 years particularly in the North-West and to share wider international perspectives from North America and Europe
- To look at the government and service contexts today and look forward to the forthcoming challenges from the inclusion of people with multiple disabilities through to the challenges and opportunities of the government personalisation agendas.

### Who should attend:

- Those who have journeyed with us at times across the past 25 years and who have been part of the passion in the North-West to dare to challenge convention in the development of individual community services offering real empowerment and options for people
- Those professionals who would like to touch base with their vision and look towards the future

- Professionals from other adult disciplines who should find relevance to all vulnerable groups
