Learning Disability nurses are beginning to work in a variety of settings, both within the health, education and social services as well as in the private and voluntary sector, where their skills are highly transferrable.

says, "It has been a busy few months, with the recruitment of Learning disability students for October 2007 being at an all time high at the University of Wolverhampton.

Steve is also visiting Texas University and 'Austin Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Center' in March 2008 to explore the possibility of collaborative links with both organisations and also a potential student exchange programme.
