'Abuse of vulnerable people not just restricted to Sutton and Merton' - Press Release 17th January 2007

The Healthcare Commission has carried out an investigation into services for people with learning disabilities with Sutton and Merton Primary Care Trust. In response to the findings, Barbara McIntosh from the foundation for People with Learning Disabilities has responded to the findings in a news release on 17th January.

"Low staff morale, isolation of the service, and lack of training means that staff are often ill-equipped to support and care for people with learning disabilities. These issues, combined with financial cuts to services are having a detrimental effect on the quality of life of people with learning disabilities across the country. The priority must be to train managers to help staff develop the necessary skills and values. Only through major investment will these changes take place."

University of Birmingham, School of Education and Disability Rights Commission

My School, my family, my life: Telling it like it is

The University of Birmingham, School of Education, has carried out research, funded by the Disability Rights Commission, examining the extent to which disabled children are engaged and involved in the life of their school and in after-school activities.

Sir Bert Massie, Chairman of the DRC, said:

"Our research reveals generally high expectations among disabled schoolchildren and their parents in the education system, but frustration at the many challenges in accessing appropriate support and 'seamless services'. Many young disabled people face multiple barriers in accessing after school and out of school activities.

"Some young people have given up trying to take part in the informal social life of their school and many are heavily reliant on their parents to take them back and forth to structured, formal activities. Because of these challenges, disabled children are likely to spend more time at home with their family than out with friends."

News article about advocacy for children with learning disabilities

The Foundation for People with Learning Disabilities backs the Children's Society's call for the Government to provide an independent advocate to all disabled children living away from home, but its Co-Director, Barbara McIntosh, says that the priority should be to provide good local support to every child and their family:

"Many children are having to leave their families and friends because local services aren't providing the necessary support. Growing up can be difficult for any child, but for those with a learning disability, it can be even more challenging. Children must be given the choice to stay at home, rather than be on their own sometimes hundreds of miles away from relatives.

"Our current Life in the Community project is working to enhance opportunities for people with learning disabilities to be included and supported in their local communities and we want to see this approach extended to all corners of the UK."
