### Item 1

# Valuing People Support Team Update

An article in last month's Learning Disability Today gives an update to the work of the Valuing People Support Team. They have been focusing on Transition, and in particular the role of the learning disability partnership board in providing the necessary elements for successful and inclusive transition to be achieved. In reality the article acknowledges that the lack of high aspirations, a robust system for ensuring that what matters to the young person is listened to and real equal opportunities in employment and education mean that transition is not often successfully navigated.

Peer Mentorship Project

Another article in last month's Learning Disability Today looks at a Peer mentorship scheme being run by Circles Network. Following the success of the Lets Get Together friendship group, they were encouraged to look at ways of strengthening the friendships between teenagers with and without learning disabilities in school. The non-disabled students taking part received four sessions of training which included topics such as advocacy, disability awareness, communication, personcentred approaches, inclusion and friendship. Some of the key aims of the project were for the students to get to learn from each other, respect each other and build friendships, and of course, to have fun!

# Journal of Intellectual Disability Research

School's out : pathways for young people with intellectual disabilities from out-ofarea residential schools or colleges

Planning for the transition between children's & adults' services is failing young people with the intellectual disabilities & their families in the UK. This paper looks

at the results of interviewing 15 parents of young people from 5 areas of the UK to find out what they felt helped to make a satisfactory transition from an out-of-area residential provider on to the next phase of their life. Four key issues were identified as important for successful transition. These were networking with other parents/professionals, being proactive, having enough information and good planning. Most considered a good outcome to be if the young person was happy, fulfilled and stimulated.
