The University of Stirling is very pleased to
announce the first accredited ADHD module
of it's kind in Scotland.

We know that ADHD affects approximately
5% of school aged children and 4% of the
adult population yet the vast majority never
get a diagnosis or any treatment or support.

This is largely down to a lack of understand-
ing of the disorder as well as a real dearth of
formal training in ADHD.

There is a huge range of agencies and ser-
vices who work on a daily basis with those
affected by ADHD, including nurses, doctors,
psychologists, teachers, social workers, vol-
untary sector, police and general practitioners
amongst many others.

This module has been developed to help
improve the knowledge and skills of those
working alongside the ADHD population in
order to help deliver appropriate support and
care to those affected.

Module structure: The module is delivered
on-line over a 15 week period using WebCT

What is the credit level and value: The
module is worth 22 SCQF credits at level 9
and can be taken as a single unit or
integrated into a programme of study

Assessment strategy: students will be
examined through the development of a
5,000 word portfolio pertaining to their area of
practice
