Speakers

Margaret Fray is the author of *Caring for Kathleen: A Sister's Story*. This recounts the life of her sister Kathleen, who was born with Down's syndrome in 1927 and died at the age of 70, some 12 years after developing the early signs of Alzheimer's disease.

Dr Tony Holland is based at the Department of Developmental Psychiatry at the University of Cambridge. He has spent many years working in the field of learning disability, and has carried out pioneering research into the relationship between Down's syndrome and Alzheimer's disease.

Diana Kerr is research fellow at the Centre for Research on Families and Relationships, University of Edinburgh. Her area of research relates predominantly to learning disability and dementia. Diana is an advisor to service providers and planners who support people with dementia and people with a learning disability and dementia. She is also a freelance trainer to direct care staff, managers, health and social work professionals, carers and people with a learning disability. She provides training on the needs of people with dementia, and in particular on the needs of people with a learning disability who have dementia. Previously Diana was the course leader for the MSc in dementia studies at the University of Stirling

Dr Mary McCarron is an international expert in the field of intellectual disability and dementia. Dr McCarron has played lead roles in assessing symptoms of dementia, developing specialist clinic services, and consulting on day-to-day care management. She is the policy and service advisor on dementia care for the Daughters of Charity Service.

13 March 2008 Sexuality – what's different about dementia? Venue: Unison, 165 York Street, Belfast Cost: £120

This one-day workshop will explore issues of sexuality in the context of people with dementia, whether they are elderly, have a learning disability or early onset dementia. It will address sexual identity; myths and realities; ethics and legislation; carers; sexuality; and staffing issues. The workshop is aimed at staff and managers providing care for people with dementia, or those involved in commissioning, inspecting or planning services.

Communication and assessment Venue: Unison, 165 York Street, Belfast Cost: £120

Communication is the key to understanding people with dementia. This one-day workshop takes a practical approach which will help staff get communication right more of the time. Assessment tends to focus on losses, but there is also a need for assessment that is affirming and which focuses on strengths and abilities. The workshop is suitable for social workers, nurses, care home managers and workers, home care managers, allied health professionals, ambulance personnel, care managers and medical staff.
