

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Meeting the needs of people with learning disabilities from BME communities

Valuing People Now, the Government's three-year plan for better services for people with learning disabilities, says that commissioners and providers of services are failing to meet the needs of people from BME communities.

Statistics show that the number of their children and young people from BME communities who have special educational needs and more profound disabilities is increasing, with more families than ever before needing services.

Yet families tell us that services frequently fail to meet their needs.

Despite Government legislation to promote equality and end race discrimination, few statutory services can demonstrate a serious commitment to meeting the needs of people with learning disabilities from BME communities.

But it is difficult to provide culturally competent services if there is no effective dialogue with those communities. Statutory services can struggle to engage with this frequently "hard to reach" group and, where there is engagement, families may have unrealistic expectations or may themselves struggle to understand the realities of delivering services in today's economic climate.

Giving us a voice

ARC, BILD and Mencap are bringing people together for constructive dialogue in 9 Regional Summit Meetings around England.

This 18-month project, funded by the **Department For Communities and Local Government** under its **Tackling Race Inequalities Fund**, will give you the opportunity to talk and learn from people with learning disabilities and family carers from BME communities.

We will also launch a national **Charter for Inclusion** and invite you to sign up to it as part of your ongoing commitment to delivering quality services.

- You will have the opportunity to meet local people from BME communities, to learn about their specific cultures, to hear about the problems that they have and find out what they need from your services
- Your strategic plan for future services will be based on first-hand knowledge

- You will meet families from BME communities who could be involved in your Learning Disability Partnership Board
- You will have the opportunity to explain the problems and realities of delivering services today
